1. This survey is an interim product of the Expert Survey Workgroup and other participants in the Eurogang Research Program. Investigators are invited to use this and other copyrighted instruments developed by the Eurogang Program, under the following conditions:

- You complete the “Request for Use” form identifying yourself and describing the research purpose for which you will be using the instrument(s). Obtain form from cmaxson@uci.edu.
- You communicate with a member of the Eurogang Program so that we can learn about design advancements.
- If you make a new translation, it should be back-translated into English by an independent party. Please send a copy of the new translation and the back-translation to the Eurogang Program (to cmaxson@uci.edu) to be available to others needing a version in your language (you will be identified as the source of the translation). Please inform us of any difficulties in translating particular terms or items on the instrument.
- Presentations and written reports should acknowledge the instruments with: "Instruments developed by the Eurogang Program". Please provide us a copy of any reports or publications resulting from your use of the instruments. With your permission, these may be posted on the Eurogang website.

2. Attached is draft of a mail survey, but could be adapted to be delivered in person, over the telephone or by email. Brackets (“[]”) denote places where individual researchers should insert information as appropriate. Researchers should provide multiple copies of the entire survey when respondents can answer for more than one geographic area/neighborhood and multiple copies of Question 6 grid page when respondents know more than one group.

3. Troublesome Youth Groups or Street Gangs (not individuals) within defined geographic units are the subject of the expert survey. The groups of interest are defined at the beginning of the survey, which represents the consensus definition developed by the Eurogang Research Program. We encourage researchers to use this definition without any alteration.

4. Appropriate respondents have familiarity with youth groups within any specified geographic unit of interest, although the level of familiarity will certainly vary. This survey could be distributed to multiple types of respondents – police, social welfare, school, social service or community residents--and many geographic units--neighborhood, community, town or city. The goal is to have good representation from many different types of respondents, ideally within the same geographic unit. As the survey form is pilot tested and developed further, it is critical that individual researchers document the sample design for respondent and area sampling units and provide them to us.

5. Respondent identification information is requested in this survey for assessment of expertise and for further clarification. A consent item is included, but individual researchers may expand on the informed consent procedure adopted here. Please inform us of different consent procedures.

6. This survey has been developed in collaboration with researchers from many countries. It collects key information designated by Eurogang as critical to describing and understanding the groups of interest. Changes in item order, wording or substantial meaning, or the omission of items, place our goal of the collection of comparative, multi-method, cross-national information at risk. If you find it necessary to delete or otherwise change items offered in this survey, please inform us of any changes you make to the survey. We appreciate your efforts to document alterations in these original instruments. We expect that items of special interest to individual researchers may be added.

Consensus item alterations: a) may replace throughout “geographic area” with neighborhood, quarter, division etc. as appropriate; b) Item 6h ethnicity: may select ethnic/national categories for inclusion as appropriate; c) Item 6r drugs: “illegal” may be deleted if appropriate; d) Item 6w and group descriptions: may replace “Classical” and “Neo-Classical” with “Traditional” and “Neo-Traditional” as appropriate.

Please do not modify or exclude critical definitional items: Question 6 items b, c, d, e, j, k, l, n and o.

Our concern in the following questions is to get an estimate of the number and nature of Troublesome Youth Groups or Street Gangs in your area. We define the groups of interest as follows:

ANY DURABLE, STREET-ORIENTED YOUTH GROUP WHOSE INVOLVEMENT IN ILLEGAL ACTIVITY IS PART OF THEIR GROUP IDENTITY. “Durability” means several months or more and refers to the group, which continues despite turnover of participants. “Street-oriented” means spending a lot of group time outside home, work and school – often on streets, in shopping areas, in parks, in cars, and so on. “Youth” refers to average ages in the teens or early twenties or so. “Illegal activity” generally means delinquent or criminal behavior, not just bothersome activity. “Identity” refers to the group, not individual self-image.

Group types: Research in Europe and the U.S. suggests that Troublesome Youth Groups or Street Gangs often fit within one of the five descriptions provided below. Please read these five descriptions and indicate which one *best* describes this group. If none of them describe it, please circle “none” in Q. 6w and indicate why.

The **Classical** group is a large, enduring, territorial group with a wide age range and several subgroups based on age or area. Classical groups often exist for 20 years or more, with members who could be as young as ten years old and as old as thirty or more. Classical groups with subgroups often have a hundred or more members, and they claim and defend their territories.

The **Neo-Classical** group is a newer territorial group with subgroups, generally with a history of ten years or less and fewer members than the Classical group. Neo-Classical groups may be medium-sized, such as 50 or more members. They probably have subgroups based on age. They have a narrower age range than Classical groups, and they claim and defend their territories.

The **Compressed** group has a relatively short history and usually is comprised of adolescent youth aged 12 – 20 or so. Usually, Compressed groups have fewer than 50 members and have not formed subgroups. They have existed less than ten years and often only a few years. They may or may not claim and defend territories.

The **Collective** group resembles a disorganized mass of adolescent and young adult members without the clear characteristics of the other four groups. Collective groups are bigger than the Compressed groups and with a wider age range between younger and older members. They might have as many as a hundred members, but without clear sub-groups despite being in existence for 10 or 15 years. They may or may not claim and defend territories.

The **Specialty** group is focused in a narrow crime pattern, and exists more for criminal than social reasons. Its smaller size and area of operation serve its criminal purposes. Typical examples are drug sales groups and skinhead groups. The other four types of groups commit a wide variety of crimes, but Specialty groups are more organized around their narrow criminal purpose.
